Center Paramedic Program Redesign

- A full two weeks of review at the end of class

Clinical 1 Requirements

In addition to the 120 hours on an ambulance, each of our students will complete the following hospital shift requirements:

- ED (64 hours)
- Burn Unit (4 hours)
- Pediatric ED (8 hours)
- Psychiatric ED (8 hours)
- ECT Lab (8 hours)
- Med Command(4 hours)
- IV Rotation (8 hours)

Clinical 1 Expectations

While many of our students enter our program with EMT experience, this is their first experience as a paramedic student. During their 120 field hours it is our expectation they will grow from solely an EMT into starting basic ALS skills. During the first two shifts with you we hope the student can become familiar with your service, station, and ambulance. Next, we hope they will begin to function as a team leader on BLS calls. As the students are signed off on skills in lab, they can begin to incorporate those skills into ALS calls within your comfort level. Just as they are beginning to develop into ALS providers, they will move onto their Clinical II site. When they return for Summative Field Evaluation we hope you are impressed with the progress they have made.
